### **Dvar Torah - Spontaneous Emotions?** by Rabbi Avi Meth

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We tend to think that it is impossible to control intense emotions, but great people know how and know when to express such emotions.

A story is told about Rav Yisroel Salanter who was told on *Shemeni Atzeres* that his child had passed away. He did not react for the entire *Yom Tov*. Right after *havdalah*, he broke into tears

and cried for three hours straight.

When יעקב אבינו first meets החל in this week's , מרשה tells us that he cries. רש"י gives two explanations for his reaction. Firstly, he saw with דוח הקודש that he would not be buried with her. Secondly, he came empty-handed, and unlike his grandfather's servant אליעזר who came laden with gifts for her mother רבקה, he had nothing to give her. The

שפתי חכמים explains that רש"י is required to give both of these answers because each has a difficulty preventing it from answering the question unaided. According to the first answer - that he would not be buried with her - how would he have explained to her why he was crying? He certainly would not have told her about her own death! According to the second answer - that he didn't have anything to give her - would a צדיק like יעקב be concerned about a lack of money? This is, at face value, perplexing. If יעקב אבינו was so distraught that he was brought to tears, why debate what he was thinking? His weeping could be understood as a spontaneous emotional response, an uncontrollable reaction to great anguish. What room is there to discuss the possible of whether or not it makes sense to be upset? We see that we have the capability of being in control of our emotions. יעקב did not suppress his emotions; he knew the appropriate occasion to express them.

## Dvar Halacha - V'sein Tal Umatar L'vrachah by Yehuda Silverman, 10th Grade

Starting with Ma'ariv on Monday, December 5th, we include V'sein Tal Umatar L'vrachah in the Bracha of Bareich Aleinu. Because this year is followed by a leap year, we begin one day later than the usual date, which is December 4<sup>th</sup>. We continue to insert this request until the Mincha preceding Pesach. If one forgets to say this formula at the appropriate time but remembers at some point before the conclusion of the Bracha, one should insert it at that point and then continue to the end of the Bracha. One who remembers after concluding the Bracha, even if before the next Bracha, should insert the request before the words Ki Atah Shomea Tefilah in the Bracha of Shema Koleinu. On fast days, when Aneinu is included at this point, one should say V'sein Tal Umatar before Aneinu. If one remembers after beginning the Bracha of Retzei, one must return to the Bracha of Bareich Aleniu. If one remembers concluding the Shemoneh Esrai, one must start from the beginning. Within the first thirty days, one is generally not accustomed to adding V'sein Tal Umatar, and must repeat the Shemoneh Esrai in a case of doubt of whether it

was said. If one says *V'sein Tal Umatar* at the wrong time of year, one must repeat the *Bracha* of *Bareich Aleinu* with *V'sein Bracha*.
